I am as guilty as anyone. Had it not been for my spouse and her persistence, I most likely would have gone with the recommendation, "Don't worry about it" and would have succumbed to the cancer back in 2018/2019. I read an article this very morning entitled, "Don't Ignore the Symptoms of Prostate Cancer!" There are at least 5 symptoms to recognize it and early onset checkups are crucial! Prostate cancer is the leading cause of death in men over 55. 1 out of every 3 men will have it and those are not good odds! It is the number "1" cause of death in men over 75!

I know that most of us dream of sitting somewhere on the bank of a beautiful lake, or on the beach of some ocean in the sunshine, where we will drift off into the sunset someday. But that won't happen if you do not pay attention! For your own good and your family, follow up, do a PSA test regularly after detection, digital check yearly, and biopsies every 18 months. "Outlaws and Mavericks"



Hello, it is me your VLOA Historian, Jim Donnelly.

Doug Wilson and I have been collecting a photographic history of the Outlaws for many years. Doug has complied an impressive amount of statics and various lists of persons, places, and aircraft. He is amazing at these tasks. But now to the reason I am writing.

Once in a while, we are lucky enough to find someone who will share a memory of their time with the unit. This kind of information was the reason I started the History Project more than a fifteen years ago and I am sorry to say response has been extremely rare. So, I switched to collecting pictures of the unit from those first days in 1964 to the Stand Down in early 1972.

I am again asking for your input via your written recollection of an event or person from your time in Vinh Long. I would also love to scan your photos, slides, awards, and other documents. Don't let your experiences be lost forever.

The history of our unit will be donated to various Vietnam depositories of history. More than 17,000 images and 1000 pages of documents, along with dozens of audio recordings and videos have already been donated to the historian at Rucker. Frank Estes presented a copy of the History late last year at the request of the Branch's Historian. The dissemination of the information has already begun.


I am at present scanning W2 George Karcher's photo album from his 1965 tour. The collection continues to grow and preserve another brave man's time with the unit. It is easy to have a folder in your name added to the collection. Just box everything up and ship it to me, I then scan and enhance the scans with the various software I have. I then place a copy of all the scans plus a copy of the photos from your time at Vinh Long on a flash drive which is included in the return box of all the materials you provided.

If you chose to donate the hard copies of the materials, then they will be stored in my "Outlaw Room" until the time when it all is turned over to The Vietnam Center & Sam Johnson Vietnam Archive at Texas Tech University.

We have several "newish" members and I appeal to you to dig up those old physical memories from your time in Vinh Long and send then to me. They will be treated like the treasure they are.

If you think you are suffering memory loss.....Anosognosia, very interesting... In the following analysis the French Professor Bruno Dubois, Director of the Institute of Memory and Alzheimer's Disease (IMMA) at La Pitié-Salpêtrière - Paris Hospitals, addresses the subject in a rather reassuring way:

"If anyone is aware of their memory problems, they do not have Alzheimer's."

It often happens in people 60 years and older that they complain that they lack memory. "The information is always in the brain, it is the "processor" that is lacking."

This is "Anosognosia" or temporary forgetfulness.

Half of people 60 and older have some symptoms that are due to age rather than disease.

The most common cases are:

- forgetting the name of a person,
- going to a room in the house and not remembering why we were going there,
- a blank memory for a movie title or actor, an actress,
- a waste of time searching where we left our glasses or keys ..

After 60 years most people have such a difficulty, which indicates that it is not a disease but rather a characteristic due to the passage of years.

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Many people are concerned about these oversights hence the importance of the following statements:

1."Those who are conscious of being forgetful have no serious problem of memory."

2. "Those who suffer from a memory illness or Alzheimer's, are not aware of what is happening."

Professor Bruno Dubois, Director of IMMA, reassures most people concerned about their oversights: "The more we complain about memory loss, the less likely we are to suffer from memory sickness."

Now for a little neurological test: Only use your eyes! 1- Find the C in the table below!

If you pass these three tests without problem:

- you can cancel your annual visit to the neurologist.
- your brain is in perfect shape!
- you are far from having any relationship with Alzheimer's.

We are truly blessed, so share this with your over-65 friends, perhaps it can reassure them.

Sometimes, it makes a lot of sense to look back to see where we came from. It's been 25 years since a handful of former Outlaws decided to get together for a mini-reunion. That led to an effort to find as many of the original Outlaws as possible. The work of this small band of Outlaws resulted in finding over 100 former Outlaws, Mavericks, Roadrunners, and 28th Signal Detachment members. It led to the first ever Outlaws Roundup in 2000 in Branson, MO.

Well, any effort like this requires resources, in addition to personal hours invested in the effort. Here is the first financial report of the newly formed Vinh Long Outlaws Association.

The VLOA has come a long way since the day our bank balance was \$605. Today it stands at \$37,130.31 (see VLOA Financial Report elsewhere in this newsletter).

We have conducted 11 biennial reunions at numerous locations, which along with our quarterly *Outlaws Newsletter* has brought many new members to our organization. The more members we had, the more we found that our financial situation improved.

In the early years, we had very limited funds. As a result, we had to add a 15% kicker to the reunion registration fees to help defray some of the reunion preparation and incidentals cost, such as banners, signage, refreshments in hospitality room, taxes, ball caps, welcome bags, pads, pens, etc. Getting membership dues payments was always a struggle, but that was the only revenue we had, other that anything left over from the reunion.

Then, we started the 50/50 raffle and silent auction that brought in enough funds to operate for the following two years to pay for all the expenses the VLOA had begun to accrue, such as an improved *Outlaws Newsletter*, updated and improved Outlaws website, blocking five domain names that used the Vinh Long Outlaws name, and covering some of the cost of incidentals for each of the reunions.

In conclusion, our financial underpinning is the result of a lot of factors, such as membership dues, registering for and participating in reunions, individual donations, participating in the 50/50 raffle, and contributing to and bidding on items in the Anderson Silent Auction. So, if you are one of the foregoing, pat yourself on the back for keeping the VLOA financially viable well into the future.

<u>Membership</u>

Membership in the Vinh Long Outlaws Association (VLOA) is a pivotal part of our organization. Here are a few ways it impacts us:

▶ Provides the basis for being an IRS approved nonprofit, tax-exempt war veterans' organization ["...all contributions made to and for the use of the VLOA are tax-exempt...." IRS letter, 30Apr2001].

► Membership dues provide one revenue stream that helps keep the VLOA financially sound.

▶ Provides a forum and biennial reunion for former Outlaws, Mavericks, Bushwhackers, Roadrunners and allied/attached units' members to keep up-to-date with their comrades.

▶ Provides input for and maintains a history of our heritage: the 62nd Aviation Company, A Company 502nd Aviation Battalion, 175th Aviation Company, B Troop 1st-158th Aviation Regiment, and 175th Aviation Company (Europe).

Beyond the foregoing, the following will discuss the status of dues paying, and what the dues and other revenue streams are used for.

Well, it's that time of year again when we remind you of your duty to renew your annual membership or join as a Life Member or Patriot Life Member. *Over half of the members listed on our roster are not paying dues, with less than half financially keeping our VLOA afloat.* If you are one of the members on our roster who is not current in paying dues, we ask you to be a part of the supporting members by joining us as an annual or life-time dues-payer. Doing so will help ensure a financially sound future for the VLOA as our membership numbers will continue to decline. The last page of this newsletter contains a membership application form or you may download one from <u>www.vinhlongoutlaws.com</u>.

We often hear the question: "Well, what are our dues used for?" Please take a look at our annual financial report contained in this newsletter and you will quickly see the variety of expenses we incur: quarterly newsletters to everyone on our active roster (including Honorary Members), mailing out reunion shirts, biennial reunion preparations, annual webhosting, annual website domain names renewals (we pay for five even though we only use one in order to block attempts by someone to use a website name similar to ours), postage, supplies, bank statements, administrative support, and biennial reunion incidentals.

During our reunion years, we experience other expenses that quite often are not covered just by our annual and lifetime dues payments. In turn, we conduct two revenue generating events during the reunion to help cover annual and additional expenses. These are the "Anderson Silent Auction" and the "50/50 Drawing." The Anderson Silent Auction contains items donated by our own membership or items donated by someone who wants to help in this event. Therefore, the Anderson Silent Auction costs us virtually nothing and is a 100% income-producer. The 50/50 Drawing is where we sell tickets during the Annual Roundup and then split 50% of the income for the event with members whose winning tickets are drawn. The remaining 50% goes into our general fund for payment of expenses.

In closing, membership in the VLOA is pivotal to the successes we have had and helps provide a financially sound base for continuing our heritage into the future. Please consider paying your annual dues or join as a Life Member or Patriot Life Member. Further, you can also help financially by registering to attend our next Outlaws Roundup in Nashville, TN at a date to be determined.

I had a fish house that was 4'x 8'x 6' tall that I had built. It had carpet on the floor with insulation on the walls and a battery powered light on the ceiling and a radio out of a car. All the comforts of home.

The heater was upright, and you could put a coffee pot on it or a frypan if you wanted to fry fish or something for a meal. This was an angling house and it had four holes on one side to fish through and we sat on chairs on the other side with a door between them. Very comfy it was. I also had a spearing house which is quite different as the hole is usually 2'x4' wide so you can look down into the water and see the fish, if they show up! You also cannot have a light on, or you can't see down into the lake! You use a live chub or hand made lures that you suspend down into the water to entice the fish to the hole where hopefully you are able to spear the ones you want and are legal to take.

But I digress, I really need to tell you a story about when my granddaughters were young, and Grandma Bonnie and I would go fishing with the boat in the summer. The girls just loved to go along. We went many times during that summer and then fall came, and then winter.

I got my fish house ready and the ice was thick enough to drive on safely so I put it out where I thought was a good spot and gave it a try.

I caught some Sunnie's and some Crappies. It was a good spot so the weekend came, and I called the girls to see if they would like to go fishing with us and they were thrilled! We packed some food and into the old pickup and off we went.

Now this was many years ago, before seat belts and all that safety stuff. The girls were young, four and six maybe. We were driving down the road and the little one on the seat turned around and let out a scream! "Grandpa! You forgot the BOAT!" We laughed and told her not to worry as we were going ice fishing. Well, she didn't understand. As I drove out onto the lake, I tried to explain that we were driving on the lake, and she did not think that was right. We got to the fish house and opened it up. I started the heater, cleaned the ice out of the holes, we got in and I told them to sit down on the carpet. I turned the light off and told them to look down into the holes. They were so excited, and she said "Grandpa! There's the lake! So innocent and so wonderful they are and then they grow into adults.

Contrary to what you may believe the snow and the ice does melt here in the Spring and we have beautiful Summers where the temperatures do go up and over 100 degrees at times and it gets uncomfortable. Falls with the most beautiful show of colors as the leaves on the trees turn and get ready for winter. It is also the time to harvest the many grains that we grow here. We make hay and usually get three cuttings that we put in the hay sheds to feed our animals during the winter. If you have not heard, I do own riding mules and had a team that rode and drove. We pulled our carts, wagon, and our sleighs with them.

That's where this story was leading to. I have a few different sleighs and what great fun it is to go on a sleigh ride. That is something that even a lot of people around here never get to do. We have a lot of friends that own mules and horses. We know a couple that own a farm north of town. They have a place back up the hill behind their home place where they have a huge grove of oak trees and over the years, they built a log cabin back in the woods. It is a one room cabin with a loft. It has a cast iron wood burning stove to cook with and an open fireplace. They have no electricity there so the lights they have are oil lamps. There is a huge wooden table with chairs to sit around it.

On Christmas Eve their children come home after church with their children and Grandpa Gene has his team of Belgian horses hooked to the big bobsled and loads them all up and he heads out to the cabin in the oak woods where the whole family spends Christmas Eve. (Cont. from pg. 17) In the years past when their kids were young they all spent the night, (as there was room for them) and then spent Christmas Day there also. with no electricity, no internet, AND NO cell phones! What a wonderful holiday they had!



We are so fortunate as when Gene decides to have a sleigh ride he invites his friends to bring their horses and mules and if they have a sled of sorts to bring that also. They usually have a great turnout with anywhere from 5-10 teams and sleds. They invite other friends also just to come along to experience what an awesome time it is to be drawn through the woods all bundled up in your winter gear in an ages old sleigh like people were transported around all the time many years ago.



You arrive in the farmyard and bring your food you brought to share and soon a team and a sled will appear out of the woods and stop. You climb aboard and off you go. As you go through the woods you will see more sleds heading in different directions making the rounds. As you get back to the cabin you will see all kinds of people standing around a big fire ring visiting and laughing with old friends and making new ones. (Cont. on pg. 19)

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(Cont. from pg. 18) They are drinking hot coffee or hot chocolate they got from in the cabin where Gene's wife Diane is visiting with everyone and making hot beverages in big old pots on the stove. She also has a "huge" pot of her homemade chili on the stove if you care to have some. The table is full of sandwiches, deviled eggs, salads, bars of all sorts. Cookies, cake, and anything else you can imagine. You won't go away hungry.



You then can sit around and visit, or you can get on board another sled and head out for another ride. This goes on all afternoon with people coming and going and everyone has an excellent time. No one complains about the cold, although there is always talk about the weather, either past or future.



It really is a once in a lifetime experience for most folks as you can imagine. We are fortunate to have access to awesome friends, the animals, the equipment, the location, and most of all, the climate! For those of us that were born and raised here feel as if we were lucky as we have four wonderful seasons! They are all beautiful! (Cont. on pg. 20)


