The Rose Bowl Game 1966

Having left Vinh Long in September of 1965 along with the rest of you and having five months left to my three year enlistment, I was assigned to an aviation unit stationed at Fort MacArthur, California flying out of Long Beach Airport. Fall was in the air and college football was in high gear. The N.C.O. Club afforded me a haven to watch allot of the games on the weekends. I would be able to catch up on a great season after having missed the one the year before. Life was good! But that was all about to change.

One morning in December, after roll-call, I was summands to the Orderly Room to see the Company C.O. What could he want with such a "Short-Timer" as me? He informed me that I, along with two other G.I.'s on Post, was invited by the Rose Bowl Parade Committee to see the Parade being one of three newly returning Viet-Nam veterans. The committee would need an answer in the next couple of days.

The UCLA Bruins were slated to face off with the Michigan Spartans. It was stated that the Bruins, who were ranked #5 in the country, had no business playing the #2 ranked Spartans in the Rose Bowl Game. Bubba Smith was about to showcase the end of his college career in this game and we knew later what a great pro career he would have. This game had possible upset written all over with all the typical media hype. I wanted to watch this one! Because the offer from the Rose Bowl Committee only talked about an invitation to the parade I informed the Company C.O. that I really wanted to watch the game on TV and would decline their invitation.

The day of the game, I prided myself for the decision that I had made to stay behind. I watched as the limousine drove off with the two other G.I.'s on their way to the parade. Later that day I made my way to the N.C.O. Club to settle down to all that TV had to offer by televising the game and drinking 3.2 beer in a dingy, smoked filled, military club. I was somewhat surprised at half-time when the two other vets had not returned from the parade; strange! The game ended with UCLA beating Michigan 14-12 in an upset.

The next morning I found out from the two other guys that they indeed had gone to the parade. Right after the parade they were approached by the Rose Bowl Grand Marshall for that year who just happened to be Walt Disney. Walt extended them a personnel invitation to join him in his VIP Box on the fifty yard line to watch the game! Half time also got them a standing ovation from the **100,087** fans that were in attendance. In the weeks to come the two other guys were also invited to be Mr. Disney's guest at Disney Land and be marshals at one of the theme parks Main Street Parades.

There should have been 100, 088 fans in attendance. Need I say more!

OUTLAW LIVING HISTORY DVD SERIES PROJECT

Dear Fellow Outlaws, Mavericks, Bushwackers and all support elements:

Hi, my name is Jim Donnelly and I was an Outlaw (OL18 gunner/crewchief) 71-72. I am writing to ask for your help with a project I started six months ago after I retired from the Virginia Beach Fire Department. Over the next few years I want to assemble a history of the Outlaws to be placed on a series of DVDs. I have had many good responses and now have documents, film and pictures from dozens of people, each in a folder in their name. Thanks to people like Larry Cox, Col. Tom Anderson, Doug Wilson, Jim Spiers, Jim Pengov, JR Wright, Bob Giles, Harry Khachadourian, Tom Heydinger, George Bassett, Mike Kenna, Peter Schladweiler, Joe Wisneski, Jon Nyhre, Jim Burroughs, Dave Logan and the list goes on, I have 3 DVDs of history materials at the present time. But the bottom line is the project needs your help. The goal is to have at least one DVD for each of the eight years the Outlaws served in Vietnam and that's a minimum.

I would love to give you your own folder on your time period DVD. I could really use 8mm film or converted video, pictures, slides, copies of orders, awards, patches, "year books", and your stories (written, video or audio), whatever you think will help convey the history of the unit. I want the series to include as many personal accounts as possible to make it "our living history". It is this type of material which will make the DVD series more than just a collection of facts. At any rate it is a way to get your Outlaw, or Delta related pictures, patches and whatever scanned onto a DVD and perhaps even touched-up.

I will bear all expense of insured transport of materials to me and their safe return back to you. If you have the time to scan the items that would be a big help but I know most of you do not. If you can scan your materials please use 600 dpi jpeg for pictures and 300 dpi or greater for anything else. These settings allow for some minor editing to clean up the images. All materials sent will be treated as the treasure they are and returned to you as sent with a copy of them on CD/DVD to make it easier to share and keep safe.

This is a labor of love, not a for profit venture. It is an attempt to capture the history of Outlaws before it is lost. The DVD will remain free to all Outlaws and their families who ask for it and the materials on it will never be used for commercial purposes.

Please feel free to call, write or email with any questions. Please do not let the portion of the unit history you hold be lost, share it with other Outlaws, their families and the world. Welcome home and I hope your life after Vietnam has been a happy and productive one.

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

Danube River Christmastime Cruise By Linda Isbell

How long has it been since you lived in or visited Germany? We were stationed at Goppingen, Germany, for 1 year during the 70-71 time frame so our German experience was rather limited. This was mainly because Ernie got sent back to Viet Nam for his 3rd tour and the children and I went home to San Diego. But that's another story.

This past fall we got a river cruise catalogue in the mail that showed a European cruise from 23 December to 2 January. It sounded interesting so we booked it for our daughter Cheryl and ourselves. We flew on Lufthansa from Dallas to Frankfurt, Germany nonstop, which Ernie says he'll never do again. We changed planes and flew on to Prague, in the Czech Republic. It was only another hour of flying, thank God.

While in Prague we stayed at the Hilton Hotel which is very nice. Christmas Day had us on a bus/walking tour of Old Town Prague. Lots of history in Prague to include castles and churches and dozens of statues of old dead chezks. (Apparently they were cancelled.) There are some impressive bridges in Prague—by the way do you remember that Europe in December is c-o-l-d. We finally got a good chance to warm up with some beer and brats in a quaint little restaurant. Later that afternoon we were able to visit the Christmas markets, which was one of the reasons for going to Europe at Christmas to begin with. There were lots of neat places and things to see at the markets, but Ernie said we had no room to bring things home on the plane, so not much buying went on. He is such a spoil sport sometimes. That evening we went to a local Czech restaurant and enjoyed a typical Czech meal and entertainment. At least it was warm on the bus and while eating. Rather good food I might add. The following morning we took another c-o-l-d walking tour and then had lunch in a Rathskeller. More beer and brats.

That afternoon we were off by bus to Nuremberg. Upon arrival we toured the city before eventually boarding our cruise ship. It was a gray dreary winter day in the city but the guide was interesting. They even showed us the relics of the Nazi regime from WWII. Finally it was time to get to the ship so we didn't have to get off the busses and walk around. I was glad because it was c-o-I-d.

The ship was fairly new. It is built on a barge base with three levels of rooms on either side of a center hall. The rooms are very nice although the shower was so small you merely soaped up the walls and then got in and turned around. (Or so Ernie said, I had plenty of room.) These types of ships are built very narrow so they can pass through the river locks. Even so, they were very spacious in the dining area and in the lounge. Lots of beer—no brats. We found that a great many of our fellow cruisers were from Australia and Canada. All in all we had occasion to make many new friends among our fellow travelers. We cruised all night and docked each day for visits to the many towns along the Danube.

After cruising all night we awoke in Regensburg, Germany, the home of the oldest sausage restaurant in Germany. The brats were very good, with beer, yum yum. Regensburg is one of Bavaria's cultural centers. Out walking about it was really, really c-o-l-d and even layering his clothing Ernie was about to freeze. So we found a Sport Shop and he bought a down filled ski jacket and a warm pair of gloves. They even had his size! Later I found a cute Nutria hat that I bought at the oldest hat shop in Regensburg. It was a nice time in a delightful city especially now that we were both finally warmer. By the way, the dollar versus the euro made this a very expensive set of clothing for Ernie.

The next day found us in Passau-Linz, Austria. We opted for the full day tour of Salzburg which took us to the popular Sound of Music sights. Also saw the church where "Silent Night" was first played. It wasn't quite so c-o-I-d as the sun did come out that day.


The following day we arrived in Melk-Vienna. In the morning we saw Melk's magnificent Benedictine Abby, one of Europe's largest Monasteries. The view from the terrace over the Danube and surrounding countryside was breathtaking! Vienna is known as the "City of Music," and it is thought to have inspired the creative genius of Mozart, Beethoven and Strauss. In Melk we took the optional tour of a local Winery owned by three families. It was interesting to enter a very modern building and then walk down into the cold brick storage areas that survived WWII. Plus we had a wine tasting and bought a few bottles of wine.

New Year's Eve and Day were spent in Vienna, Austria. But by that time all three of us had the stomach flu. Yuck! I did manage to go into Vienna on New Year's Day with a group from the ship and have a look see. But Ernie & Cheryl elected to stay aboard the ship and rest.

This ended our river cruise and the next day we flew to Frankfurt and then directly to Dallas. It was another loooonnng flight, especially for Ernie who was still ill. We would do another river cruise just not during the winter. The passenger group is smaller and you get to know most everyone. Even with getting sick we had a good time. But believe we will fly business or first class the next time we take that long a flight. Fortunately Ernie had an empty seat next to him in economy class so he could stretch out while flying home. We were mighty glad to get home to our own beds.
