

Our Missing Comrades



We recently capped another great VLOA reunion and I think all who attended agreed that it was as meaningful, and enjoyable, as all previous reunions. We've all agreed, many times, that the reason our reunions are so successful,, is the shared <u>comradeships</u> we developed with each other during our combat tour.

National Director Bob Allen, and the VLOA Steering Committee, are already planning the 2024 reunion. It's obvious that the VLOA continues to remain, and will for some period of time, a viable organization. And so, with the memories of our 2022 reunion still fresh in mind, I thought I'd share some memories, and experiences in in the VLOA.

For example, back when we arrived in Vinh Long, I would watch with pride those 20 year old pilots and crewmen, who unhesitatingly flew into hot LZs and firefights. I'd think, what motivates these young men to take such risks? It certainly wasn't for self-serving, or altruistic, reasons. No, it was because the grunts on the ground, our **comrades-in-arms**, needed the help we could provide.

How were these young men prepared for combat when they were so young? Intense training and shared motivation helped a lot because every one of us was concerned about measuring up, wondering if we had the right stuff.

We all may have been in social situations where we've felt somewhat isolated, like a stranger even around people we may have known for a long time. And yet, when we'd walk into a room full of Viet Nam vets, **comrades** we'd never met, it would feel like we were coming home. Our reunions do this for us!

Now that we are decades into being part of our communities, we have mostly put behind us those calendar days in Viet Nam. Some days were boring, some days were exciting, some were dark with anguish. And, we all fantasized about going home, getting away from the anguish of the war. But, we are the fortunate ones. Some did not come home with us.

At each reunion, we narrate a remembrance to "<u>Our Missing Comrades</u>". During our ceremony, we do not refer to our lost members as friends, as fellow soldiers or as fallen members. We prefer to use only the word "<u>comrades</u>". We feel that's the most heartfelt praise we can give to those with whom we served with in VN.

For some, the Wall in Washington is a place to ease the pressure of the past. To bring back some feelings we may have chosen to suppress, where we can talk to our fallen <u>comrades</u> to tell them they are not forgotten. It's a place to confess our guilt that we lived through it and they did not.

We have all lived in different worlds from the Vietnam of 60 years ago, but our shared history will always draw us to each other. We know that that draw is much deeper than merely remembering the past and swapping laughs and stories.

As I looked at us at the Reunion, it was obvious that we are all older, all grayer, some with less hair and somewhat more belly. But, we have done our duty. To our families, our communities, to our country. And, above all, **to our missing comrades.**





Outlaw Aircraft Memorialized On Headstone.



Bill Chambers enlisted in 1968 with the objective of flying Army helicopters. He attained that objective when, after finishing initial helicopter training, he was assigned to Viet Nam and subsequently to the Vinh Long Outlaws as Maverick 31. Bill flew with the Outlaws for more than half his Army service, regularly flying Maverick 31.

Bill's pride in his Outlaw service, along with his assignment as Maverick 31, likely played a role in his request that, after his death, his headstone include an etching of a Huey. Maverick 31, is clearly displayed on the tail number shown on the Huey on his headstone. Military honors were accorded to Bill at his graveside service 31

Additionally, Bill included in his will that donations could be made to his favorite charities. To honor his request, Bills wife Carol has made a generous \$500 contribution to the VLOA in Bill's memory. In turn, the VLOA has made Carol an Honorary Patriot Life Member.

Coincidentally, Frank Estes, was the original Maverick 31.





In Loving Memory William (Bill) Matthew Hensinger April 29, 1940 - October, 13, 2022



Raised in Queens, New York with his German parents, Matthias and Lena, and went to St. Thomas church and school in Woodhaven, NY.

Bill kept his sense of humor till the very end. Had a knack for one liners even up to his last days. Loved telling jokes especially the Lufthansa one. Every place we went whether with friends, social events, professional or military reunions, he would ask me if he had ever told his favorite joke to that group. Even when I told him that he already did, somehow before the event ended, he managed to stand up and start the joke with a big smile. His German accent is what everyone loved; SO, they politely listened again and again.

His first ambition was to be a baseball player thanks to his stick ball days but it was not to be. He wanted to become a commercial airline pilot. But in June of 1963, Bill enlisted in the US Army and Uncle Sam and the US Army, because of the Vietnam War, had different plans for Candidate Hensinger. So off to Mineral Wells, Texas he went to helicopter flight school. He called me from a phone booth on the post and said he would not hang up and go outside because the Sergeants and Tack Officers were waiting there just to harass the candidates to test their resolve. It was a long phone call.

His helicopter career began from there; first graduating flight school to a year in Vietnam, to a Flight Instructor while still on active duty, to a helicopter traffic patrol reporter on CBS evening news. Then the Nassau County Police Department on Long Island, New York hired him as the first Chief Pilot in the new Aviation Bureau. 30 years later he retired. His Army training provided the skills for his safe landings but his drive for Safety and Perfection mandated the constant practice hours. He passed his expertise on to all the pilots he trained. A fellow Police Officer called to say that Bill's professional safety skills have been passed down to countless pilots.

During all those years, Bill studied to complete his Bachelor's degree in criminology while always holding down a part time job. He rose to the rank of Sergeant in the Police Department.

The New York Yankees and NY Giants were his teams and Jack Nicklaus his golf idol. Music was an enjoyable pastime.




The Funeral Mass was celebrated at St. Joan of Arc Catholic Church in Hershey, PA.


Don was preceded in death by one sister, Vicky Gray; and one brother, Arol S. Spade.
